## There's no doubt that the Australian Apprenticeships sector is heating up.

With the recent announcement of Australian Apprenticeship Support Services (AASS) contracts - including a shake-up of the framework - followed by the Federal Government budget, there's plenty of takeaways and opportunities.

In particular, clean and green energy, small business, and Australian manufacturing were named in a range of Government support initiatives.

#### **Green Apprenticeships**

As a champion of Green Apprenticeships, we welcomed the news of expanded eligibility for the New Energy Apprenticeships Program. It will enable more apprentices to access \$10,000 payments with an aim to increase completions in this priority sector.

In addition to attracting new workers through apprenticeships in the renewable energy sector, a further \$13.7 billion will be invested, providing access to grants, subsidies and other support for Australian solar panel and battery manufacturers to gain capability and resilience against current supply chain disruptions.

#### **Small Business**

We were also pleased to see Group Training services named as a key support mechanism for Australian small business.

The budget included provision for small and medium sized businesses to engage GTOs like MIGAS with subsidised fees for those seeking clean energy, manufacturing, and construction apprentices.

#### **Women in Trades**

The Government is investing \$55.6 million to launch the Building Women's Careers program which will deliver around 10 large-scale projects and several smaller local projects, to support women to access flexible training in clean energy, construction, tech and advanced manufacturing.

## Olympic legend still inspires

Olympic swimming legend Duncan Armstrong OAM is still setting the pace in work and life. *Host Quarterly* dived at the chance to chat to Duncan about where life has led him following his inspirational presentation to the winners and finalists of MIGAS's annual MiScholarship Program.

## Duncan Armstrong became a household name when he claimed one of only three Olympic Gold medals that Australia won at the Seoul Games in 1988.

The victory also broke the 200 freestyle World Record to win Australia's 100th medal in Olympic competition.

But with the punishing early morning training routine, and the glory of the medal podium behind him, Duncan continues to inspire a new generation.

## What do you look back on most fondly about your time in elite swimming and as an Olympian?

It was a special time...yes, Bruce McAvaney special! I swam for Australia for 10 years and it was a great decade of my life. I dreamt of being an Olympian since I was six years old growing up in Rockhampton, so it was a dream come true to wear the Green and Gold.

I feel blessed to have had the opportunity to join the Laurie Lawrence squad because it was an environment that taught me everything I needed to know about how to win races consistently and become a champion.

#### Earning elite athlete status takes tremendous self-discipline. What keeps you on track, and how did you develop that level of discipline?

Swimming is like any other pursuit in life, there are rules and behaviours that demand your attention if you're going to be a winner at it.

Swimming is all about turning up to do the hard work every day to improve your times, fitness, ability, and handling pressure. I had to commit to 11 sessions of swimming every week, swimming a total of 400 laps of a 50m pool six days a week.

To commit to all this disciplined behaviour I knew I had to be around people who understood the work, the pressure, had goals like mine, and were just as determined to get the job done. Even today I have a daily and weekly fitness, eating and wellbeing routine that serves to have me at my best at the age of 55. I know it supports what I want to get out of life and when I show discipline and consistency I can tackle anything I have a go at.

## You pursued a "mature-age apprenticeship" - how did that come about?

I married into a family of builders, and at the age of 44 was out onsite. I thoroughly enjoyed the environment and the community of tradesmen and women who I worked with.

The lessons I learnt in the pool certainly were evident on the building sites in regards to honesty, integrity, hard work and authenticity.

## What's your message to young people who are just starting out on their apprenticeship journey?

Always try to find people who are better than you at something you want to be good at, then ask them questions about how they achieved it.

I've spent most of my adult life getting answers out of people who are better than me, and I love the hunt! When people get good at something it's usually through blood sweat and tears from hard work. Your curiosity is the jet fuel to make things happen for you.

## You spoke passionately to our MiScholarship recipients about putting aside ego. Why is that so important?

It wasn't until I did the hard work of finding out who and what I am that I was able to drop a lot of beliefs my ego was getting me in trouble about. Once your ego is under control it means you are in control in almost all situations.

Find your pain, you find your ego. Find your ego, you find your beast. Find your beast, you find your truth. Find your truth, you find your peace.

## Bright careers beginning in energy industry

Apprentices and trainees from the Western Downs region have taken their first steps towards bright careers within the energy industry.

Origin Energy recently welcomed its 2024 intake of apprentices and trainees who will work in a variety of roles across the Australia Pacific LNG network.

As upstream operator for Australia Pacific LNG, Origin is responsible for developing its coal seam gas fields in the Surat and Bowen basins and the main transmission pipeline that

transports gas to the LNG facility on Curtis Island near Gladstone.

Each year, Origin welcomes new trainees and apprentices to mentor and elevate the next generation of energy professionals, preparing them to tackle future industry challenges and opportunities.

In partnership with MIGAS Apprentices & Trainees, positions are provided for people in the Western Downs to ensure the region remains a part of the industry.

Five apprentices and trainees from the Western Downs recently joined Origin's Integrated Gas Team, with another five from the Maranoa Region. "I'm excited about this opportunity. My goal is to learn what I can to become multiskilled, so I can build a career at Origin and potentially explore other parts of the business, broadening my skills as I go," she said.

Origin General Manager, Asset East, Steve Thatcher said Origin is dedicated to motivating and nurturing the next generation of energy professionals.

"We aspire for our apprentices and trainees to come out of this program ready to contribute their skills, knowledge, and passion to fuel progress and innovation in the energy industry," Steve said.

# APPRENTICE SUPPORT SERVICE CONTRACTS AWARDED

In April 2024, the Department of Employment and Workplace Relations released the outcomes of the Request for Tender for Australian Apprenticeship Support Services (AASS) 2024-26.

These AASS providers support apprentice employers like MIGAS by registering Australian Apprentice training contracts. The new suite of Support Services commences from 1 July 2024, and was awarded to nine organisations that will provide services under a new Generalist and Specialist framework.

Specialist contract holders will focus on supporting female apprentices in male dominated trades, First Nations apprentices, and apprentices working in the Clean Energy sector.

As a Group Training
Organisation (GTO), MIGAS
welcomed the expansion of the
New Energy industries supported
by the Federal Government to
include apprentices working in
solar installation, large-scale
renewable projects, electric
vehicles, green hydrogen, and
renewable manufacturing.

MIGAS will work alongside the nine selected AASS contract holders to ensure a smooth transition for our apprentices and national host company network.
